Lastly, I want to sincerely express my gratitude to the participants for their contributions, commitments and sacrifices as well as the effort of ZSF and GIZ team.

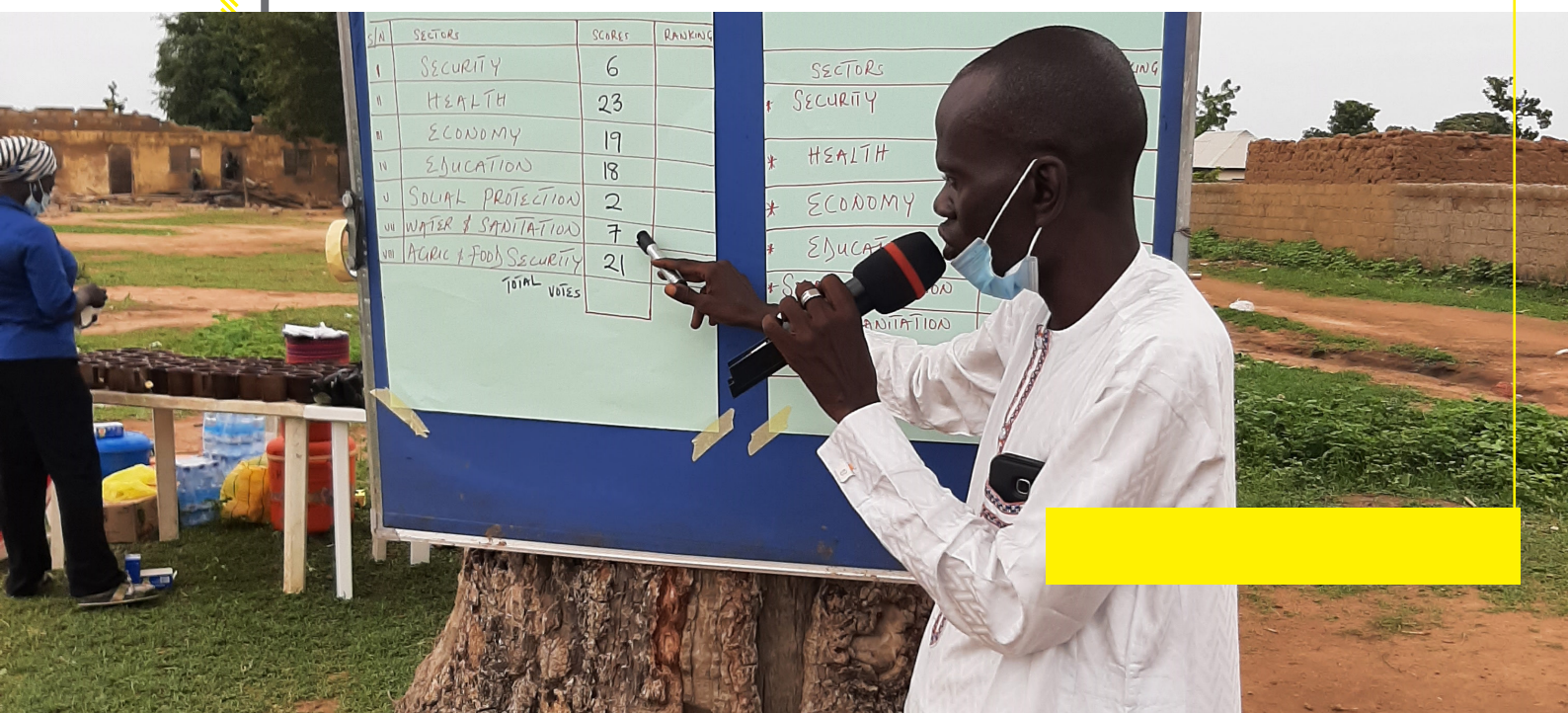

ABOUT THIS PLAN

Hong LGA is one of the seven Local Government Areas of Adamawa State that suffered the Boko Haram insurgency in 2014. Apart from the destruction of physical infrastructures such as schools, water points and health centres in the local government, people were killed and displaced, and many fled to safety. The physical and psychological trauma of the Boko Haram insurgency required concerted efforts for the victims' full recovery.

In light of this, the local government and the traditional leaders of Hong LGA have put the reconstruction and long-term development needs of the local population as their priority. With the support of the GIZ programme "Support to Strengthening Resilience in North-East Nigeria" (funded by the European Union and the German Federal Ministry of Economic Cooperation and Development). They have started the Community Development Planning (CDP) process, which aims to bring various community actors, vulnerable groups, women and men of different ages and socio-economic backgrounds at ward level to plan for the development of their communities through a participatory bottom-up planning process. The CDP process has provided the opportunity for the community stakeholders to come together under one umbrella to discuss and analyse their livelihoods, including problems, causes, strategies and potentials that could aid in their solution. It is a capacity building process where members of a community are active participants in their problem identification, analysis of developmental issues affecting them and brainstorming on solutions to solve the problems while putting the peculiarity of their communities in the centre of all the efforts.

While stakeholder sensitisation, ward analysis and community mobilisation played a crucial role in the CDP process, the Community Development Planning session itself was the heart of the process. This four-day session is similar to the village/town meetings where members of the community gather to discuss issues that affect their development and plan activities to overcome those development gaps. The major objectives of the CDP session are as follows:

- To provide an opportunity for different socio-economic groups to discuss and analyse their livelihoods, including problems, causes, strategies and potentials within the community that could help them solve these problems

- To build people's capacity to participate more actively in development issues affecting them as individuals and their community as a whole
- To create a platform, where the people can discuss with their political and traditional leaders
- To identify and prioritise the needs of the community

Participants of the CDP session were carefully selected cutting across all demographics and socio-economic groups within the ward including vulnerable groups such as IDP, disabled people, and orphaned children. The CDP process in Hong LGA was facilitated by the Governance Component of GIZ's Resilience Programme and their Civil Society Organization (CSO) partners: Zireenza Support Foundation (ZSF), Environmental Care Foundation (ECF), Goggoji Zummuchi Development Initiative (GZDI), Budgeting and Planning Departments of the Hong LGA, Adamawa State Planning Commission and Ministry of Local Government Affairs. The CDP processes were supported and guided by the local government and traditional leadership.

The tangible results of the Hildi CDP process and especially the CDP session is this Ward Development Plan. Representatives of Hildi ward validated the CDP Plan and its content.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: KEY FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The people of Hildi ward came together for four days from 21 – 24 June 2021 at Guw Primary School Hildi, to discuss and determine the development priority of our ward in what we call the CDP session. The session was conducted in two streams (A & B) concurrently to adhere to the COVID-19 protocols. The Community Development Planning brought together various actors from different socio-economic backgrounds to plan for the development of our community through a bottom-up planning process at the ward level. During the CDP process, voice was given to the voiceless and the ordinary citizens had the opportunity to discuss with their leaders. The CDP session birthed our Ward Development Plan that contains our problems, solution and activities that are required to solve them. The Community Development Plan is a key strategic document that provides short- and medium-term actions over the next five years. This plan, if fully implemented would make Hildi ward a strong, progressive and resilient community. Our plan contains significant inputs from the community to provide a clear direction for donor partners and the government to deliver improved services and outcomes for the community in the future.

Hildi ward is one of the 12 political wards that constituted the Local Government Area. Hildi ward borders Uba (Development Area), Mubi North LGA and Borno State. Hildi is a vast spread town that cut across

some parts on the main Mubi-Michika road and other parts behind the hills situated at the centre of the town. Hildi ward falls under Uba/Gaya Constituency of Hong LGA's. The second constituency is named Hong constituency comprising of Bangshika, Daksiri, Hong, Husherizum, Shangui and Thilbang wards.

Marghi, Michika, Fulani, Hausa, Fali and Kilba are the predominant languages spoken in the ward. Our main source of income is related to cash crop farming, animal rearing, and trading.

We envision Hildi ward as a big town with a sufficient and portable water supply, good mobile network, an enabling environment for orphans to develop to their full potential. We the Hildi ward People are economical and resourceful. Some of our existing resources include trees, lawyers, youths, professors.

To better understand our developmental needs, we identified, discussed clustered and prioritised our problems that require urgent attention. We ranked our problems first based on gender and age group and then in plenary during the CDP session. In addition, we sat together and analysed the causes of these problems, we did not stop there, we went further to identify possible solutions to the problems and proposed activities on how to tackle the difficulties. Our most pressing community development





challenges identified during the CDP are dispensaries not functioning, insufficient drugs in our health facilities, inadequate teaching materials in all the schools, insufficient modern farming facilities, Lack of portable drinking water, lack of electricity, high rate of kidnapping, and high rate of divorce.

We discovered that these challenges have affected our development, livelihoods and security negatively. Hence, we collectively voted for Health, Agriculture & Food Security and Economy as our top 3 priorities. To follow up on our future community development, we selected 26 persons among ourselves as the ward project supervisory committee.

THIS IS OUR WARD

GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION

Hong LGA is located at latitude 10.1837 and longitude 12.5529. Hildi ward is one of the 12 political wards that constituted the Local Government Area. The area is characterized by the typical rainy and dry seasons. The dry season lasts for a period of 5 months (November to March), while the rainy season runs from April through October each year. The annual rainfall ranges from 700 -1,050 mm. The temperature in the area remains high in most parts of the year being as hot as 39°C between March and June. It is cold only between December and January with temperatures ranging from 27°C and 32°C. Hildi ward borders Uba (Development Area), Mubi North LGA and Borno State.

Hildi is a vast spread town that has some parts on the main Mubi-Michika road and other parts behind the hills situated at the centre of the town. It is a 2 hours' drive from Hong town due to the bad road network. The 12 wards of Hong LGA are separated into two (2) state constituencies with each having 6 wards. Hildi ward falls under Uba/Gaya Constituency of Hong LGA's second constituency is named Hong constituency comprising of Bangshika, Daksiri, Hong, Husherizum, Shangui and Thilbang wards. On the mapping of villages results from our ward analysis showed that Mukuninvi and Guw followed by Dzakwa, Paragalda and Pungel have the highest number of respondents.

DEMOGRAPHICS: POPULATION

With most wards in Gombi LGA gradually slipping into a post-conflict context with minimal frequent attacks by the Boko Haram terrorist group, the number of IDPs and displaced communities continue to decrease exponentially. Hildi ward with a total number of 6 communities and from our data generated via the ward analysis 441 persons were interviewed, with the highest range/active age being 36-59 and 25-35, followed by 15 - 24 and 60 and above.

Results of our analysis show that the ward is a host community, housing IDPs as well as returnees. The predominant religion in our ward is Christianity followed by the Islamic religion with less than 5% of respondents agreeing to the presence of traditionalists in the ward. There are over 17 ethnic groups in ward which includes Margi, Michika, Fulani, Hausa, Fali and Kilba. In line with the ethnic compositions, Margi and Michika is the most dominant language spoken in the

ward followed by Fulani and Hausa languages.

SUMMARY OF THE SOCIO-ECONOMIC SITUATION

In line with the data generated during ward analysis, farming/livestock is the primary source of income for respondents in Hildi ward, followed by business and trading with only a few being civil servants, artisans, non-government teachers, religious leaders and security actors. Animal rearing and carpentry are two of the most popular economic activities among men in our ward. Our women are mostly involved in the sale of Akara, farming, and the extraction of groundnut oil. Following from our economic activities the monthly personal and household incomes falls within 0 – N5,000 naira monthly followed by 5,001 - 10,000. Majority of the people in Hildi ward are very confident that their living situation will improve in the future while few were very unsure of their situation. The most important market day in Hildi ward is Tuesday. The following data was gathered through the wards analysis, which is an important aspect of the CDP process. This exercise provided information that helped to better understand the ward, but it does not promise to be exact or full.

The problems identified were grouped into 7 major thematic sectors. These sectors are

- Water and Sanitation
- Economy
- Agriculture and Food Security
- Education
- Security
- Health and Social Protection.

The tables below show the prioritisation of our needs according to votes, which were conducted first according to gender and age groups and then in a plenary discussion.

SECURITY

In addition, we believe that WPSC should lobby for jobs from the PAWECA, Civil Service Commission and private sectors. Alternatively, WPSC should lobby for NGOs/ wealthy people to assist the youths with start-up capital.

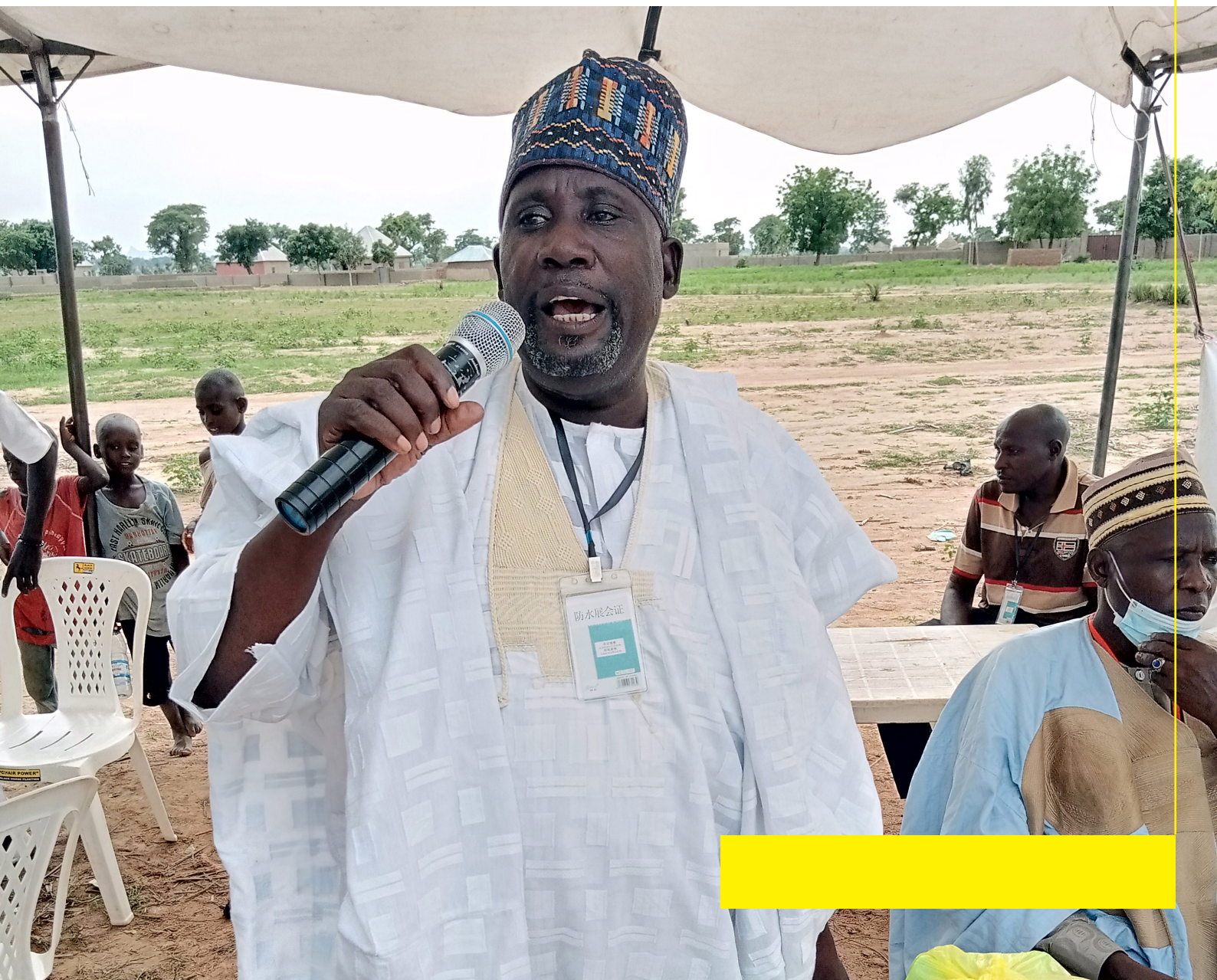
THIS IS HOW WE MONITOR

They were also advised to select representatives that are willing to work voluntarily from different socio-economic groups for the development of their ward as there won't be any salary or stipends at the end of the month. This committee composition contains at least 50% women which is a fair representation of all stakeholders considering equity, effectiveness, efficiency, legitimacy, and sustainability
