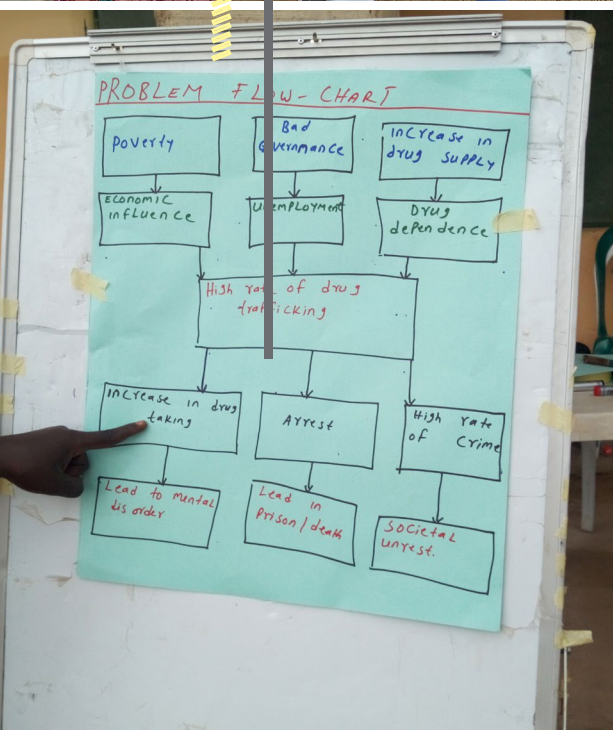

## MESSAGE FROM THE VILLAGE HEAD



**ARDO HARUNA  
AHMADU**

My name is Ardo Haruna Ahmadu, the Village Head of Gella; a position I have held for 7 years since the death of my father. Gela ward is a mix of people with different ethnicity, cultural and religious backgrounds. Irrespective of this, we live together in peace and harmony without any form of discrimination. Interestingly, food is one of the symbols of our tradition. Our traditional food is Mazudjuguda and Mabuota while our favourite soup is made from Beans leaf with Maize and Guinea corn used to prepare the solid or (swallow as it's locally called in Nigeria). Our cultural clothes are mostly hand-made and unique.

Furthermore, we have witnessed so many changes one of which is in our educational system. In previous times, people especially the rich and royal families were skeptical about enrolling their children into schools because of the perception that these children may become slaves if allowed to gain education and for this reason, only the poor sent their children to school. Today, things are a lot different, we are beginning to see the obvious value of education and hence sending more of our children to school. Although, there has been some improvement with regards to the availability of classrooms and other school facilities, however, more work needs to be done by the Government. Another improvement is in the health sector; with the availability of a clinic in our ward, we don't need to go far for healthcare.

Growing up in the village, I used to have a circle of friends I played certain traditional games with; these games include: Yarindo, swimming in the village stream, hunting and animal rearing. We are a very hospitable people but things started changing when the Boko Haram insurgency escalated to our ward and it became difficult to trust because of the issues we faced. A lot of people fled the village and I was particularly a refugee in Cameroon for some weeks until it subsided and we returned to our community. As a result, the traditional leaders decided to do a community census to account for those who have returned and those who are yet to return. Part of the things we did was to verify where each individual had been since the displacement and even to date, the Jauros (i.e. Ward Heads) are to be informed when strangers come into the villages.

On the Community Development Planning (CDP) session, the inclusiveness of the CDP process and the style of facilitation made it unique and impressed me a lot. I strongly believe it will bring about positive change in my community. I wish the government at all levels in Nigeria could adopt this process as a matter of policy, it will help curb misplaced priorities and tailor



people-oriented decisions. Therefore, our expectation from these CDP sessions is to bring development, unity and progress to our ward through the knowledge and experience gained. It will also ensure that everyone has a responsibility and a role to play in their community.

Therefore, I urge the present and future generation to hold on to our cherished values of love unity and hard work, to take formal education seriously as an enduring legacy, to be law-abiding and to be responsible citizens. My profound gratitude to the European Union, the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development for taking an interest and providing resources to educate my people on sustainable development; GIZ for organizing the process and CPPLI the partnering Civil Society Organization (CSO) for facilitating the sessions.

## ABOUT THIS PLAN

Gella ward is one of the 10 wards of Mubi South LGA. Mubi South is one of the 7 Local Government Areas of Adamawa State that was affected by the Boko Haram insurgency in 2014. Apart from the destruction of physical infrastructures such as schools, water points, health centers etc. in the Local Government Area, people were killed and displaced and many others fled for safety. The physical and psychological trauma experienced during this time requires concerted efforts for the victims' full recovery.

Against this background, the Local Government and the traditional leaders of Mubi South LGA have put the reconstruction and long-term development based on the needs of the local population as their priority. With the support of the GIZ programme "Support to Strengthening Resilience in North-East Nigeria" (funded by the European Union and the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development), the Community Development Planning (CDP) process was implemented. The purpose was to bring together various community actors, vulnerable groups, women and men of different ages and socio-economic backgrounds together at ward level to plan for the development of their communities through a participatory bottom-up process.

The CDP process has provided the opportunity for community stakeholders to come together under one umbrella to discuss and analyze their livelihoods, problems, causes, strategies and potentials solutions. It is a process where members of a community are active participants in their problem identification, analysis of developmental issues affecting them and brainstorming on solutions to solve the problems. This is done while putting the peculiarity of their communities at the center of all the efforts.

While stakeholder sensitization, ward analysis and community mobilization played a crucial role in the CDP process, the Community Development Planning Session itself is the heart of the process. This 4-day session is akin to the village/town meetings where members of the community come together to discuss issues that affect their development and plan activities to overcome those development gaps. The major objectives of the CDP sessions are:

- To provide an opportunity for different socio-economic groups to discuss and analyse their livelihoods, including problems, causes, strategies and potentials within the community that could help them solve these problems
- To build people's capacity to participate more actively in development issues affecting them as individuals and their community as a whole
- To create a platform, where the people can discuss with their political and traditional leaders
- To identify and prioritize the needs of the community

Participants of the CDP session were carefully selected cutting across all demographics and socio-economic groups within the ward including vulnerable groups such as IDP, persons living with disability and orphaned children.

The CDP session was facilitated by the Governance Component of GIZ's Resilience Programme and their Civil Society Organisation (CSO) partners: Clear View Integrity Foundation (CVIF) and Grace & Hope Youth Foundation (GHYF), Child Protection and Peer Learning Initiative (CPPLI), Goggoji Zumunchi Development Initiative (GZDI), Zireenza Support



Foundation (ZSF) together with other members of the CDP team such as state/local government officials as well as traditional leaders who supported and guided the process.

The tangible results of the Gella ward CDP process and especially the CDP session is this Ward Development Plan. The Plan and its content were validated by the representatives of the Gella ward.

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: KEY FINDINGS

The Community Development Planning (CDP) session took place in Gella ward from 26th - 29th of August 2019 at Gella 1 Primary School. Participants were selected from all communities of the ward comprising Traditional, Political and Religious leaders; Head of households; Artisans, the disabled and Internally Displaced Person (IDPs). The CDP sessions were facilitated to provide a platform for all community stakeholders to identify, discuss community problems and proffer solutions; to train participants for active future engagements in matters of development and to create a joint vision and ward development plan. Development to us is the advancement and progress of a community signified by job opportunities, standard and qualitative healthcare and other basic social amenities. Furthermore, these sessions have enabled us to identify our shared values, which are hard work, self-reliance, sympathy for one another, respect for humanity and support for one another.

Some of the resources that you would find in our communities include Farmland, economic trees, blue safaya, honey, mountains, secondary, primary and Islamic schools, health centres, football fields and places of worship. In the same vein, we face several challenges such as lack of potable pipe-borne water, refuse dump sites, high rate of armed robbery, incidents of kidnapping, drug abuse, inadequate modern farming equipment, lack of good road networks, lack of employment opportunities for youths, inadequate health personnel in our health facilities, insufficient medical equipment, insufficient secondary school teachers, lack of educational materials in public schools, insufficient classrooms, etc. At the end of the sessions, a 26-man follow-up committee was established and tasked with the responsibility of advocating and lobbying for projects on behalf of our communities.

## GELLA WARD AT A GLANCE

- The different ethnic groups in Gella ward are Gude and Fulani
- The major language spoken is Gude. Other languages spoken were Fulfulde, Hausa, Nzanyi, Higgi, Kanuri, Kilba, and Matakam
- Areas that require urgent attention in Gella ward are WASH, Education and Health

# THIS IS OUR WARD\*

Gella is one of the 10 political-administrative wards of Mubi South Local Government Area of Adamawa State, Northeast Nigeria.

## GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION

Mubi South is situated at 10.1874 latitudes and 13. 3958 longitudes and Gella ward is one of the 10 political wards that constitute Mubi South LGA in which the Local Government Headquarter is located. Gella ward shares a geographical boundary with Kwaja from the south, Gude from the north, Duvu from the Southeast and Lamorde from the Northwest.

## DEMOGRAPHIC INFORMATION

The major language spoken in Gella ward is Gude. In addition to Gude language, Fulfulde Hausa, Margi, Nzanyi, Higgi, Kilba, Babur, Matakam, Godo Godo, Kanuri and Lakka are widely spoken. The major religions practiced in Gella ward are Islam and Christianity. There are many returnees and few IDPs (Internally Displaced Persons) in Gella communities. Our ward is one of the most populated wards of Mubi South and about 325 persons responded in Gella ward during the ward analysis across all the communities (villages).

## ECONOMIC INFORMATION

The major source of income of our communities is agriculture-related activities such as the farming of cash crops like Beans, Maize corn, Groundnuts, Bambara nuts, Benny seed, Cabbage, Cassava, Cotton, Cucumber, Millets, Okra, Onion, Pepper, Potatoes, Sorghum, Soybeans, Sugarcane, Tiger nut, Tomatoes, Watermelon, Wheat, Yam, Guinea corn and other vegetables, as well as animal rearing and fish farming. The most important market days are Wednesday and Thursday while a few among the people of the community attend the market on Tuesday, Friday and Saturday.

Typically, the jobs our men do are welding, tailoring, selling of provision, mechanic work, masonry, hawking, farming, driving, cloth trading, chemist, car selling, barbing, blacksmithing and animal rearing. While our women engage in Akara selling, cap knitting, Groundnut oil making, tailoring, beads making, animal rearing, cutting and selling of firewood, soap making, calabash making, weaving, washing, teaching, Soybeans cake, etc.

The data generated from the ward analysis shows that the monthly personal and household income falls within the range of 1,000 - 5,000 Naira and 10,000 - 50,000 Naira respectively. During the ward analysis, 49% of the respondents said they are somewhat satisfied with their living conditions based on their current income.

## OUR VALUES

Respect for traditional, political and religious leaders, the elderly especially from the youths, hospitality, communal labour, honesty and hard work in addition to sharing gifts and love for our culture are some of our shared values we adhere to in the ward.

### Water and Sanitation

### Security

- A high rate of armed robbery attack in Gella ward
- Incidents of kidnapping in Gella ward
- Children are stolen for ritual in Gella ward
- Youths are used for violent acts by politicians in Gella ward
- Lack of following law and order in Gella ward

### Social Protection

- High rate of drug abuse in Gella ward
- Early marriage in Gella ward
- Negligence of orphans in some communities of Gella
- Negligence of persons with disability in Malluha
- High rate of divorce in Gelle ward

### Agriculture and Food Security

- Inadequate modern farming equipment in the whole ward
- Lack of veterinary hospitals in Gella ward
- Lack of knowledge on seasonal farming in Gella ward
- Lack of storage facilities for farm produce in Gella ward
- Lack of Agric extension workers in the whole ward

### Economy

- Lack of good accessible roads in Gella ward
- Lack of employment opportunities for youths in Gella ward
- Non-availability of GSM network service in Gella ward
- Inadequate electricity power supply in Gella ward
- Lack of fund or capital from businesspeople in Gella ward
- Lack of commercial banks in Gella ward
- Lack of conference hall for events in Gella ward

- Lack of skills acquisition centres for youth and women in Gella ward
- Lack of modern market in the whole ward

# THIS IS OUR DEVELOPMENT: PROBLEMS AND CAUSES, SOLUTIONS AND ACTIVITIES

To better understand our development needs, we collected, discussed and prioritised the problems in the ward that need our urgent attention. The tables below show the prioritization of problem sectors that came out of our internal voting process which was conducted first in different gender and age groups and then in the plenary of the CDP Session.

The problems identified were clustered in 7 major thematic sectors. These sectors are:

- i. Water and Sanitation
- ii. Economy
- iii. Agriculture and Food Security
- iv. Education
- v. Security
- vi. Health
- vii. Social Protection

The tables below show the prioritization of our needs according to votes which were conducted first according to gender and age groups and then age in a plenary discussion.
