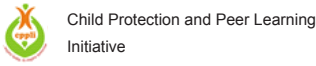
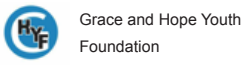
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OUR VISION

ABOUT THIS PLAN

Lamorde ward is part of Mubi North LGA. Mubi North LGA is one of the 7 Local Government Areas of Adamawa State that was affected by the Boko Haram insurgency in 2014. Apart from the destruction of physical infrastructures such as schools, water points, health centers etc. in the Local Government Area, people were killed and displaced and many others fled to safety. The physical and psychological trauma experienced during this time requires concerted efforts for the victims' full recovery.

Against this background, the Local Government and the traditional leaders of Mubi South LGA have put the reconstruction and long-term development based on the needs of the local population as their priority. With the support of the GIZ programme "Support to Strengthening Resilience in North-East Nigeria" (funded by the European Union and the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development), the Community Development Planning (CDP) process was implemented. The purpose was to bring together various community actors, vulnerable groups, women and men of different ages and socio-economic backgrounds together at ward level to plan for the development of their communities through a participatory bottom-up process.

The CDP process has provided the opportunity for community stakeholders to come together under one umbrella to discuss and analyze their livelihoods, problems, causes, strategies and potentials solutions. It is a process where members of a community are active participants in their problem identification, analysis of developmental issues affecting them and brainstorming on solutions to solve the problems. This is done while putting the peculiarity of their communities at the center of all the efforts.

While stakeholder sensitization, ward analysis and community mobilization played a crucial role in the CDP process, the Community Development Planning Session itself is the heart of the process. This 4-day session is akin to the village/town meetings where members of the community come together to discuss issues that affect their development and plan activities to overcome those development gaps. The major objectives of the CDP sessions are:

- To provide an opportunity for different socio-economic groups to discuss and analyse their livelihoods, including problems, causes, strategies and potentials within the community that could help them solve these problems
- To build people's capacity to participate more actively in development issues affecting them as individuals and their community as a whole
- To create a platform, where the people can discuss with their political and traditional leaders
- To identify and prioritize the needs of the community

Participants of the CDP session were carefully selected cutting across all demographics and socio-economic groups within the ward including vulnerable groups such as IDP, persons living with disability and orphaned children.

The CDP session was facilitated by the Governance Component of GIZ's Resilience Programme and their Civil Society Organisation (CSO) partners: Clear View Integrity Foundation (CVIF) and Grace & Hope Youth Foundation (GHYF), Child Protection and Peer Learning Initiative (CPPLI), Goggoji Zumunchi Development Initiative (GZDI), Zireenza Support

Foundation (ZSF) together with other members of the CDP team such as state/local government officials as well as traditional leaders who supported and guided the process.

The tangible results of the Lamorde ward CDP process and especially the CDP session is this Ward Development Plan. This Plan and its content were validated by the representatives of the Lamorde ward.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: KEY FINDINGS

The CDP session facilitated by GHYF took place in our community on the 11th June 2019 at Sali Isa Bello Hall, Mubi and serves as the opening ceremony for the CDP session in both Mubi North and Mubi South Local Government, Adamawa State, Nigeria.

During the session, participants were given lessons on development, planning, participatory development planning, community shared values, resources and types, problems identification, as well as understanding the root causes and effects of such problems that brought about developmental gaps and proffering solutions with a possible line of actions. A 27-member committee was formed to serve as the Ward Project Supervisory Committee, which will be responsible for advocacy and lobbying of developmental projects within and outside the state and to ensure the sustainability of the processes.

Some of our existing resources include Arable land, economic trees, food and cash crops, animals, international cattle market, commercial banks, large population, amongst others. Our shared values are empathy, respect for elders, equal justice, unity, discipline, hard work, tolerance towards all the religions in our community, hospitality, respect for the rule of law, love for our culture, promotion of education, amongst others. The major community problems we identified include Dilapidated clinics and schools' buildings, inadequate water supply, lack of agricultural farm inputs and incidents of insecurity, amongst others.

We proffered workable solutions to these problems according to sectors and outlined various activities that we will embark upon to bring solutions to the various developmental challenges of our community that we have outlined.

LAMORDE WARD AT A GLANCE

Lamorde ward is in Mubi South Local Government Area of Adamawa State. The ward headquarter is Lamorde and it serves as the political ward, village area headquarters and 23 ward head areas.

- In Lamorde ward, we have 1 Village Head (Ardo) and 23 Ward Heads (Jauros)
- The major language spoken is Gude though Ffulde, Marghi, Hausa, Higgi, Kilba, Nzanyi are also widely spoken. Also, there are also speakers of Matakam, Godogodo, Babur, Lakka, Daba, Kanuri and Igbo languages in our ward
- The major religions practiced by our people are Islam and Christianity
- Our urgent needs and biggest challenges are WASH, Health and Economy

GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION

Lamorde ward is in Mubi-South Local Government Area of Adamawa State, Nigeria. It shares a geographic boundary with Nasarawo, Mugulvu, Yelwa wards and Hong local government from the West Local Government Area. Lamorde ward is on flat terrain with few stones and cold climatic weather. Our hamlets are mostly separated by a well-defined street and few streams. The climate and terrain present a good and fertile ground for agricultural and livestock farming. Lamorde ward is characterized by a short dry season with high evaporation from February to April and a long rainy season from May to October. Harmattan or cool season is experienced usually from late November to early February. Generally, the mean monthly temperature is always between the range of 25°C to 38°C.

DEMOGRAPHIC INFORMATION

The major language spoken in Lamorde ward is Gude. In addition to Gude, Hausa, Ffulde, Margi, Higgi, are widely spoken. Other languages spoken in Lamorde ward are Kilba, Nzanyi, Matakam, Godogodo, Lakka, Babur, Igbo, Yoruba and Kanuri. The major religions in Lamorde ward are Christianity and Islam.

There are Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) in Lamorde ward that are housed by voluntary community members. Community members who were displaced as a result of the Boko Haram insurgency and have returned are also being accommodated by willing community members.

Lamorde ward population is predominantly female. In terms of age distribution, the majority of the population in our community is between the ages of 25 - 35 years. Most male adults are married and there is a relatively insignificant number of divorced or separated members of the community.

ECONOMIC INFORMATION

Our occupation is agriculture and the value chain processes which involves the cultivation of cash crops such as Maize, Beans, Groundnuts, Guinea corn, Cassava, Potatoes, Cocoyam, Yam, Wheat, Cotton, Coconuts, Benni seeds, Cabbage as well as animal rearing (Cow, Goat, Sheep) and Fish farming. The most important market days are Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

Typically, the jobs that our men do are farming, livestock rearing, petty businesses, carpentry, block/bricklaying, masonry, commercial driving trading, artisanship as well as white-collar jobs. While our women engage in the selling of Akara, tailoring, Groundnuts oil extraction, cap knitting, hairdressing, cake making and grinding of cereal crops like Maize, Guinea corn, Millet etc.

From the ward analysis report, the monthly personal and household income falls within the range of 1,000 - 5,000 Naira and 10,000 - 50,000 Naira respectively. However, 68% of the respondents are not satisfied with the level of their income while 32% of the respondents are somewhat satisfied with their income level.

OUR VALUES

Respect for traditional, political and religious leaders, the elderly especially from the youths, hospitality, communal labour, honesty, hard work, empathy and unity are some of the shared values we adhere to in the ward.

THIS IS OUR DEVELOPMENT: PROBLEMS AND CAUSES, SOLUTIONS AND ACTIVITIES

To better understand our development needs, we collected, discussed and prioritised the problems in the ward that need our urgent attention.
