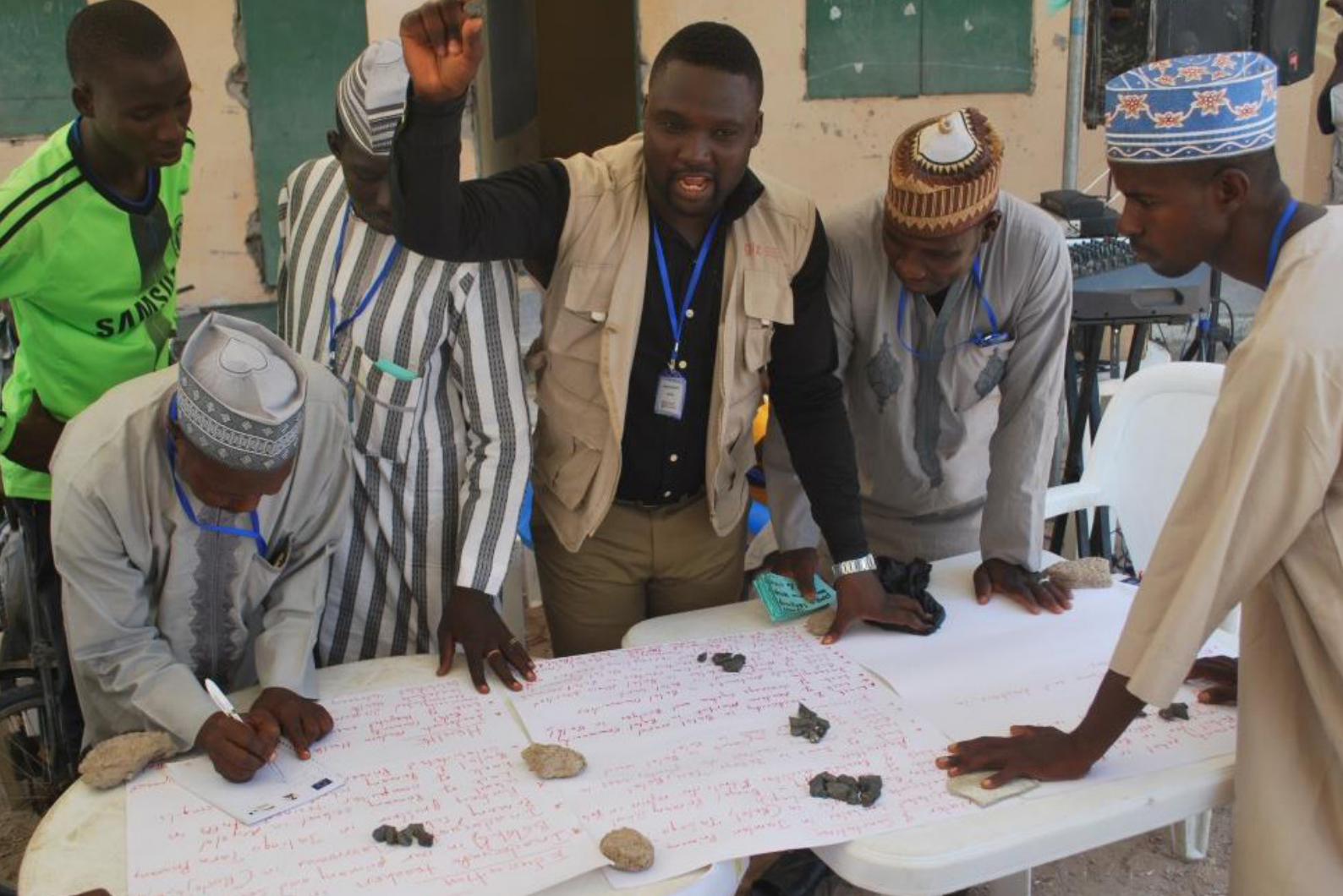

ABOUT THIS WARD DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Maiha LGA is one of the 7 Local Government Areas of Adamawa State that suffered the Boko/Haram menace in 2014. Apart from destruction of physical infrastructures such as schools, water points, health centers etc. in the local government, people were killed and displaced just as many fled to safety. The physical and psychological trauma of the Boko Haram menace required concerted efforts for the victims' full recovery.

Against this background, the Local Government and the Traditional Leaders of Maiha LGA have put the reconstruction and long-term development based on the needs of the local population as their priority. With the support of the GIZ programme "Support to Strengthening Resilience in North-East Nigeria" (funded by the European Union and the German Federal Ministry of Economic Cooperation and Development), they have started the Community Development Planning (CDP) process, which aims at bringing together various community actors, vulnerable groups, women and men of different ages and socio-economic background at ward level to plan for the development of their communities through a participatory bottom-up planning process.

The CDP process has provided the opportunity for the community stakeholders to come together under one umbrella to discuss and analyze their livelihoods, including problems, causes, strategies and potentials that could help in solving them. It is a capacity building process where members of a community are active participants in their problem identification, analysis of developmental issues affecting them and brainstorming on solutions to solve the problems while putting the peculiarity of their communities in the center of all the efforts.

While stakeholder sensitization, ward analysis and community mobilization played a crucial



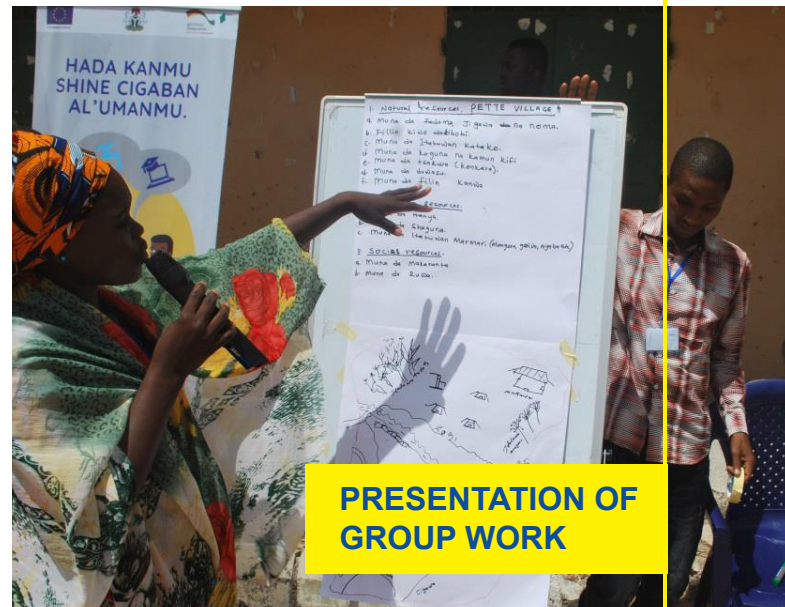
role in the CDP process, the Community Development Planning Session itself was the heart of the process. This 4-day session is akin to the village/town meetings where members of the community come together to discuss issues that affect their development and plan activities to overcome those development gaps. The major objectives of the CDP Session are:

- To provide an opportunity for different socio-economic groups to discuss and analyse their livelihoods, including problems, causes, strategies and potentials within the community that could help them solve these problems
- To build people's capacity to participate more actively in development issues affecting them as individuals and their community as a whole
- To create a platform, where the people can discuss with their political and traditional leaders
- To identify and prioritize the needs of the community

Participants of the CDP Session were carefully selected cutting across all demographics and socio-economic groups within the ward including vulnerable groups such as IDP, persons living with disability and orphaned children.

The CDP process was facilitated by the Governance Component of GIZ's Resilience Programme and their Civil Society Organisation (CSO) partners: Clear View Integrity Foundation (CVIF) and Grace & Hope Youth Foundation (GHYF), together with other members of the CDP team such as state/local government officials as well as traditional leaders who supported and guided the process.

The tangible result of the Belel CDP process and especially the CDP Session is this Ward Development Plan. The Plan and its content was validated by the representatives of Belel ward.

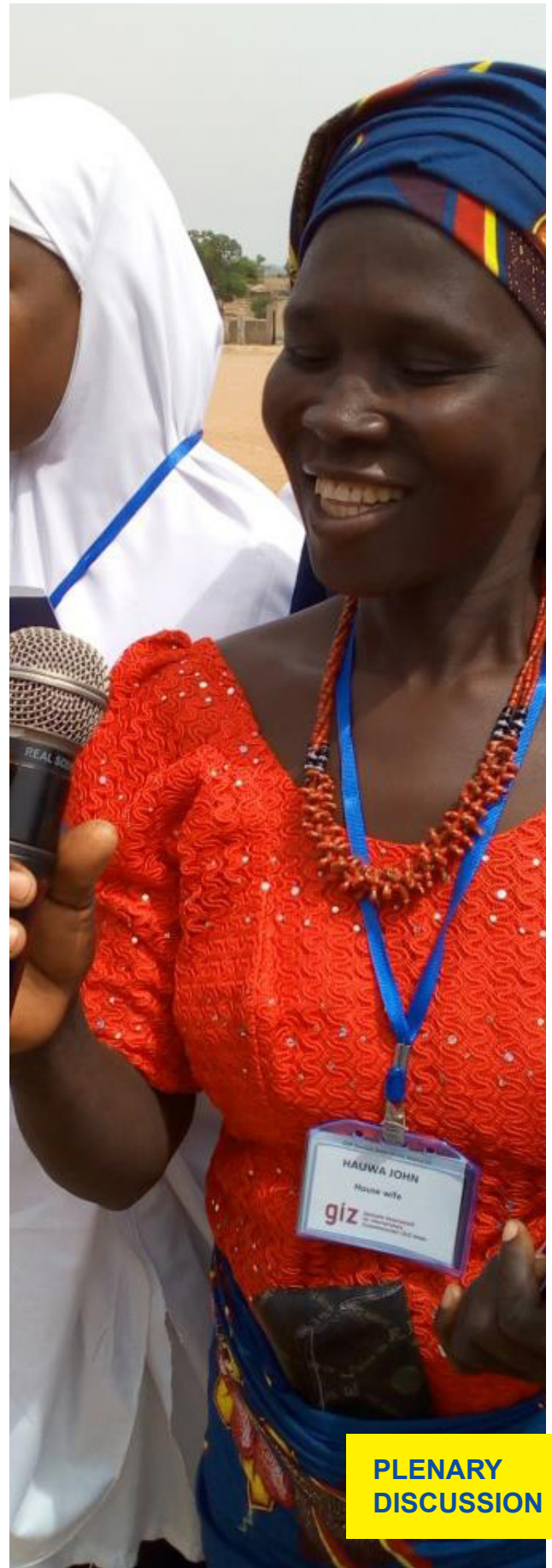


EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

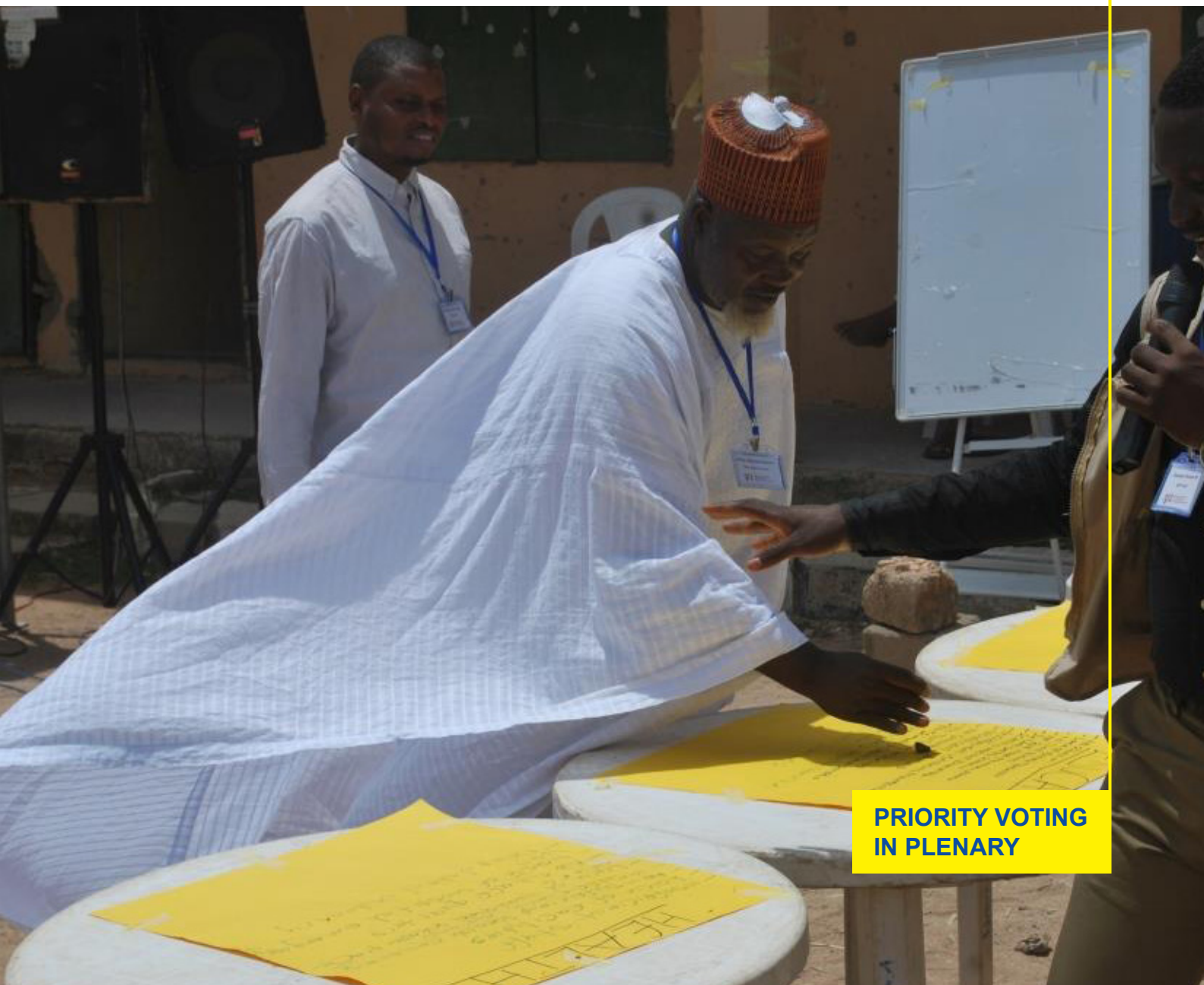
The Community Development Planning (CDP) session took place on the 22 -25 May 2018 in Belel, where representatives from all social strata within Belel ward were in attendance. The objective was to have people of Belel engage in civic dialogue among themselves including their leaders to discuss their problems and give solutions. The session is a bottom-up approach intended to facilitate a joint vision on development defined by community members and leaders of Belel Ward.

Belel is blessed with human, natural, economic and social resources namely: large farm land, varieties of crops and livestock, farming, honey, Madrid trees for timber, shea butter, limestone, columbine, and coriander. In addition, we have rivers, filling station, health centres, effective communication network, secondary & primary schools and many graduates of Universities and Colleges of Education.

Our challenges include the lack of access roads to major cities like Mubi & Yola, which denies the community, access to hospitals in Mubi and Yola. In addition we lack a bridge which links Konkol to Belel and Sorau. Health centres in Wuro Kurori, Nasarawo Kiringabu, and Boloko are ill equipped, under-staffed and lack qualified medical personnel. Schools have only few classrooms and damaged furniture.

- There are eleven (11) primary schools in Belel ward
- Belel, Fada and Boloko have three secondary schools
- We also have one Arabic school in Belel ward with the estimated number of 80 pupils

- We have the following health facilities: Primary Health care clinics in Belel, Fada, Jalingo-tara, Wuro-Kurore, Bungel and Lugga, Maternity in Bolki, Jamtari, Fada and Boloko and Dispensary in Boloko
- We have 8 boreholes, 8 wells, 4 hand pumps and streams/river across the ward

THIS IS OUR WARD*

Belel is a ward in Maiha Local Government Area of Adamawa state Nigeria. The General information about Belel below covers the various communities within the ward, main villages, distance and time to the L.G.A, name and details of the district head, village heads, ethnic groups, and languages spoken within the ward, religious groups and the organised groups / associations.

GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION

Belel is located at 90 36` 8" N and 120 49` 29" E, shares border with Garua in Cameroon republic from the south, Sorau `B` from Ward the north, republic of Cameroon from the east and Konko WardI from the west. It takes estimated 52km, 18 hours on foot, 2hours 25minute drive, 5 hours Kekenapep respectively from Bele to Maiha metropolis, the capital of Maiha local government of Adamawa state.

DEMOGRAPHICS: POPULATION

Demographic information gives us a clearer understanding of the entire people living in Belel, as to different age groups, people living with disabilities and the IDP's currently in the ward.

* The following information was collected through the ward analysis which is an integral part of the CDP process. The information gathered in this exercise helped to better understand the ward but does not make any claim to be accurate or complete.

ECONOMIC SITUATION OF THE WARD

The indigenous people of Belel engage in diverse economic activities. We are mainly agriculturalists due to available fertile land and good climate that supports farming and other agricultural activities. Below are some of the activities we engage in:

Crop Production; we farm maize, beans, rice, G/corn, millet, for both domestic and commercial purposes

Animal rearing; we rear cows, sheep, goats, turkey, chicken and ducks for both domestic and commercial use

Fishing; we engage in traditional method of fishing mostly for food and only a hand full of people fishing as a commercial activity

The activities commonly practiced by men are carpentering, mechanic, welding, mat knitting, cap knitting, dry season farming, traditional and herders. While those commonly practiced by women are tailoring, groundnut oil processing, frying, firewood selling, cap knitting, cloth sewing, etc.

HOUSEHOLD INCOMES

The most vulnerable household may earns up to ₦200 per day, ₦2,700 per month and ₦27,300 annually. About 566 households in the ward fall under this category. The moderately well off household earns ₦700 per day, ₦10,100 per month and ₦79,100 annually they are estimated to be about 2080 of such households in the ward. While the well to do household earns ₦3,400 per day, ₦31,200 per month, and ₦434,400 annually.

OUR VALUES

Our values are unity, hospitality, respect for elders, parents and traditional leaders, religion, discipline, eating food together in communal co-habitation and peace irrespective of differences in religion.

OUR STRENGTH

Our Strength

Our strength lies in the availability of different resources within our ward. This includes:

- Clay for making pots
- Rivers with fishing
- Mountain for gravels
- Fish ponds
- Fertile farmlands and animal rearing
- Good land for dry season farming
- Madrid and other trees for timbers
- Herbs
- Honey
- Economic trees (mango, orange and etc)
- Lime stone for cement
- Hills
- Columbine
- Coriander

OUR CHALLENGES

Our weakness lies in challenges we face in the pursuit of growth and development within our ward. Especially the health situation with inadequate numbers of health personnel in insufficient health centres pose a risk to our development. The lack of qualified teachers reduces the level of education, while bad roads and no bridges undermines our economic activities. Drug abuse and domestic violence are wide spread social problems in our ward.

OUR VIEW ON DEVELOPMENT

Belel Ward community perceive development as stepping up from where you are to a new improved condition or situation. Each individual within the ward has a contribution towards the development of Belel. We believe that the first step towards development is ensuring that all the children in the community acquire quality education. We see Belel Ward developing to become a Local Government in no distant time.

The stakeholders of development, we divided into four groups. They are:

(a) The Community. This includes men women and children of every category; house wives, widows, children heads of households, disabled persons, indigenes, settlers etc.

Responsibilities of the community to promote development are: Farming to feed the community, empowerment and creation of jobs for our youth to reduce idleness, to ensure unity, hospitality, solidarity and discipline, to promote peaceful co-existence, to ensure the education of their children.

(b) LG officials/staff/elected councillors. This includes everyone within the local government employed, elected or appointed from the chairman to the councillors supervisory and legislative, the members of staff of the local government, the secretary of the local government, the directors and the heads of department down to the lowest in the Local government civil service (LGCS) cadre of employment.

The responsibilities of the LG officials/staff/elected councillors to promote development include: to enlighten community on the benefits of unity and the danger of promoting religious uprising, to ensure the implementation of government policy in the community, representation of the people through the councillors, provision of security to the community, provision and Improvement of social amenities, consultation of the

community leaders on development issues, to ensure environmental sanitation within the community to promote hygiene and good health, to improve farming activities of their community by providing modern farm machineries, to ensure security, construction of culverts, boreholes, payment of their workers' salaries.

(c) Traditional /religious leaders. This refers to everyone within the traditional council system, the district heads, the village and the ward heads within jurisdiction within the ward.

The roles of traditional /religious leader's stakeholders in supporting development include conducting prayers/fasting for the community, to promote and advocate for peace, no selfish leaders but be generous to their people, to preach peaceful coexistence among one another and religions, to listen to the opinion of others.
